Group 2: Must have at least 3 stanzas of minimum 3 lines each. You must use at least three of the elements of poetry such as but not limited to sensory language, imagery, rhyme scheme, rhythm, adjectives, poetic techniques, creativity and originality.

Group 3: Must have at least 4 stanzas of minimum 3 lines each. You must use at least three of the elements of poetry such as but not limited to sensory language, imagery, rhyme scheme, rhythm, adjectives, poetic techniques, creativity and originality.

Group 4: Must have at least 4 stanzas of minimum 4 lines each. You must use most of the elements of poetry such as but not limited to sensory language, imagery, rhyme scheme, rhythm, adjectives, poetic techniques, creativity and originality. Highlight the poetic elements in your poem.

- 1. When you edit, you are editing for conventions. Edit for each of these prompts.
- 2. All proper nouns and beginning of sentences capitalized.
- 3. If you are using sentence fragments or phrases, make sure it is appropriate and purposeful.
- 4. Periods/Full Stops at the end of all sentences (not phrases).
- 5. Verb tense matches (past, present, future) and subject-verb agreement.
- 6. Grammar such as contractions, commas, apostrophes, plurals, spelling, etc.
