Year 7 Ecology – Study of a Feral Animal

What is a feral animal?

- a non-native animal that has escaped from captivity and established a self-sustaining population independent of humans.
 Eg. wild horses, pigs and cats are feral,
- animals were deliberately released to establish wild populations.
 - Eg. Foxes and rabbits
- usually causes serious damage to human interests, eg. Agriculture, natural environment, harmful to our native wildlife.
