Often it helps to read such an article twice. You can answer them in any order you like. Check with your teacher about where your answers should go, e.g. in your reading book or recorded digitally.

In **Essence of the Text**, you show your understanding of the text as a whole.

Fifty Words is for you to summarise the text: just the key points. You don't need to include details that don't change the meaning or direction of the text.

Quick Find gives you some questions that you should be able to answer quickly from scanning the text.

In **Reading Between the Lines**, you get to showcase your inference skills.

Magnifying Glass asks you to look more closely at one or two passages for clues which will help you better understand the text.

Beyond the Text gives you a concept, related to the text, to explore further.

Vocabulary and Language has you look closely at a few words or phrases, and try out using them yourself.

- b. What do you think Patuone and Nene meant by it being 'too late' to push back Pākehā, like many rangatira wanted?
- c. Explain what you believe Governor Grey saw and valued in Patuone?
- d. Why do you think having more settlers created more problems?
