Peter Snell was a middle distance runner; he was a world—record holder for the 800 metre race, 1000 metre race, the mile and the 880 yard race.


Snell trained under Arthur Lydiard; he trained by running long distances. This built up Snell's endurance.

In 1964, at the Tokyo Olympic Games, Snell won gold medals in both 800m and the 1500m. In both races, he was boxed in and had to break from the pack to win.

In 1965, Snell retired from racing. He became the director of the Human Performance Labratory at UT Southwestern Medical Centre in Dallas, Texas. Snell also wrote and co—wrote books about his career, fitness, sport and science. He died in Dallas on 12 December 2019, aged 80.

Snell's 800m record remains the fastest ever run over that distance on a grass track, and is also the oldest national record recognized by the IAAF (International Association of Athletics Federations) for a standard track and field event.

Valerie Adams is a shot putter. She won her first world championship in 2001 at the World Youth Championships at only 16 years old.

Adams is a four—time World champion, three—time World Indoor champion and two—time Olympic and three—time Commonwealth champion. She currently holds the New Zealand, Oceanian, Commonwealth and equal World Championship records with a personal best throw of 21.24 metres.

At the Beijing Olympics in 2008 she qualified for the final with the longest distance thrown, 19.73 m, on her first attempt. She won the gold with a throw of 20.56 m. Adams won 56 competitions between 2010 and 2014. She was the 2014 IAAF (International Association of Athletics Federations) world female athlete of the year.

Rio 2016 was Adam's fourth Olympic Games having won gold in the shot put at Beijing and London 2012 and finishing seventh in her debut at Athens 2004.

Adam's secured her fourth Olympic medal at the 2021 Tokyo Olympic Games where she took home bronze.


Yvette Williams was the first woman in New Zealand to win an Olympic gold medal. Williams excelled in many track and field events; she competed in shot put, discus, javelin, hurdles, and long jump. She also played both netball and basketball at a national level.

Williams won the gold medal in the long jump at the 1952 Olympics in Helsinki. Her winning distance of 6.24 m was a new Olympic record. She also finished in sixth place in the shot put and 10th in the discus throw.

Williams retired in November 1954. At the time, she ranked number one in world track and field history in the long jump, fifth in the pentathlon, 12th in the discus throw and 19th in the shot put.

Williams continued to contribute immensely to the athletics community and is widely recognised as one of New Zealand's greatest athletes. Yvette Williams died, aged 89, in April 2019.



John Walker is a middle distance runner, his running career lasted over 20 years. He was the first person to run the mile in under four minutes.

Walker has won many Commonwealth medals and set many world records. He won the gold medal in the 1500 m at the 1976 Montreal Olympics.

Walker was voted sportsman of the decade in the 1970s, due to his achievements. Walker retired in 1992 and almost four years later, he announced that he had Parkinson's disease. Walker has worked for the Manukau and Auckland council, and was named Patron of Athletics New Zealand in 2020.

Sarah Walker is New Zealand's first BMX Olympic medallist. She began racing at the age of 10 to keep up with her brother.

Walker was in the top three of the world during her junior BMX career and carried on to become world number one in 2008.

In 2012, Walker won the silver medal in the London Olympics, gaining the nick name 'Silver Sarah'.

Her goal was to win the gold medal at the Rio 2016 Olympics. Unfortunately she injured her shoulder at the world championships in Bolivia and failed to qualify.

Mahé Drysdale is a New Zealand rower. He has trained full—time since 2001. He has represented New Zealand at four Olympic Games and at nine World Championships. Dysdale began competing at a world level in 2003 and raced in the coxless four. After his New Zealand crew finished fifth in the final, he then moved to the single sculls.


Dysdale won the Olympic bronze in 2008 and the Olympic gold in 2012.

Sophie Pascoe is a Paralympic swimmer. At the age of three, Pascoe and her father were in a ride on lawn mower accident. She had her left leg amputated below the knee and was left with severe scaring on her right leg.

Pascoe began swimming at the age of 7, and at the age of 15, she was the youngest ever New Zealander to attend the Paralympic games in Beijing 2008.

Pascoe has won nineteen medals at the Paralympics. As of 2021, Sophie Pascoe holds 20 Para swimming world records across long and short course races.

Sir Mark Todd is a New Zealand horseman who competes in the discipline of eventing. He was won many competitions including gold medals at the 1984 Los Angeles Olympics and the 1988 Seoul Olympics.

In 1988, Todd awarded the New Zealand Sportsperson of the year and winner of the Supreme Halberg Award. In the same year, he was inducted into The New Zealand Sports Hall of Fame.

One of the most notable horses Todd rode was Charisma, when winning Olympic Gold Medals in 1984 and 1988.

Todd won his fifth Olympic medal at the 2012 Olympics in London. He equalled the Olympic record for the longest gap between first and last Olympic medals, 28 years. The 2012 Games were Todd's sixth, having competed in 1984, 1988, 1992, 2000 and 2008. Todd retired in July 2019.







Ian Ferguson is one of New Zealand's most successful Olympians. He competed in the KI, K2 and K4 kayak events at five Olympic Games.

Ferguson has always been a successful sportsman, achieving in running, rugby and swimming.

In 1984, at the Los Angeles Olympic Games, he won three gold medals. Later, he was named New Zealand Sportsperson of the Year. Ferguson was the flag—bearer at the 1988 Olympics in Seoul, Korea; he won another gold and a silver at these games. At the age of 40, Ferguson went to his fifth Olympics. He competed extremely well and made the finals, going faster than ever before!

Currently, Ferguson holds the New Zealand record for the most individual medals won at the Olympic Games. He was Sportsman of the year in 1984, and a finalist in 1985 and 1988. Ferguson was inducted into the New Zealand Sports Hall of Fame in 1993.

After retiring, Ferguson set up a kayak hire business and became a national coach and administrator.




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Barbara Kendall, MBE

Barbara Kendall is one of New Zealand's most successful sportswomen. When she was 17, she took up boardsailing. Three years later, in 1987, Kendall decided to join the professional boardsailing circuit.

In 1992, Kendall won the gold medal at the Barcelona Olympics. It was New Zealand's only gold medal at be won at those games and she was the first New Zealand woman to win an Olympic gold medal since Yvette Williams 40 years earlier.

In 1996, Kendall was New Zealand's team captain and flag—bearer during the Atlanta Olympics. At the Games, she won a silver medal.

Interestingly, she was the first New Zealand woman to compete at five Olympic Games. Kendall retired in May 2010.

Kendall was named New Zealand Sailor of the Year in 1992 and 1998, and won the Halberg Award as Sportswoman of the Year in 1996, 1998, 1999, 2000 and 2002. She won the Lonsdale Cup in 1999.



Dylan Schmidt is an individual and synchronised trampolinist, and former artistic gymnast. He was introduced to Trampoline at age of five by his older brother and sister.

Schmidt began competing in 2005. He trains six days a week, usually for two hours. He achieved gold at the 2014 Youth Olympic Games in China and started his senior career with a 15th place finish at the 2014 World Championship. He was named the 2014 College Sport Auckland Young Sportsperson of the Year. Schmidt placed in the top 10 at the 2015 World Championships and he gained a silver medal at the Olympic Test Event in 2016.

Dylan was the first New Zealand athlete to compete in Trampoline at the Olympic Games in Rio.

After injury kept him from competing in 2018, Dylan attended the 2020 Tokyo Olympic Games and went home with a bronze medal.

After a few years of winning national and international titles, McCartney was selected to compete in the 2016 Olympics in Rio de Janeiro. She won a bronze medal and became the youngest Olympic medallist in the woman's pole vault. She was only 19.
